Rather than starting with a blank page, reverse prompting allows you to harness the structure, voice, and decision-making of world-class authors. By first identifying masterful voices, then replicating their stylistic signatures, this workflow transforms ChatGPT from a tool into a mentor-level co-writer tailored to your genre.

Setting Up The Baseline

1

Sign Into ChatGPT: Sign in to ChatGPT and ensure it is set up for multi-turn conversations.

2

Choose Writing Format: Choose the specific type of creative writing task you need assistance with, such as a short story, script, or poem.

3

Pick an Expert: Determine the kind of expert or professional you want the AI to emulate, such as a novelist, screenwriter, or poet.
